"That, my friends, is what we call a
mυστήριον!"

A seminary classmate of mine used to say this in group study sessions whenever we ran across some biblical or theological concept that we could not recall. His comment would elicit raised eyebrows from some, and groans from the ones who were taking New Testament Greek.

Mυστήριον (pronounced: mustérion) is the Koine Greek word for mystery. Koine Greek was the common language written and spoken in Jesus' time. According to Britannica.com, Koine Greek was found "in Greece, Macedonia, and parts of Africa and the Middle East that had come under the influence or control of Greeks or Hellenized rulers." The New Testament was written in Koine Greek. (The Greek translation of the Old Testament is called the Septuagint.)

This is all to say that the English translations of the Bible we read today have been translated from ancient manuscripts originally written in Koine Greek, which themselves were transcribed by hand in a language with no lower-case letters or punctuation. Could you imagine reading this letter in hand-written form in all CAPS with no punctuation? Talk about a muoτήριον!

When translating from the original Greek, scholars must choose between multiple versions written by ancient scribes. Do they go by the oldest texts or the most commonly found ones? And how do they translate 1st Century idioms into terms recognizable to modern readers? So many questions and so many possibilities! In fact, according to the American Bible Society, there are more than 900

English translations and paraphrases of the Bible (though not all are complete). As you can imagine, biblical interpretation is an ongoing project.

The Confession of 1967 recognizes this truth, stating, "The Bible is to be interpreted in the light of its witness to God's work of reconciliation in Christ. The Scriptures, given under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, are nevertheless words of men, conditioned by the language, thought

forms, and literary fashions of the places and times at which they were written." Yet, God's word still speaks today, "where the Scriptures are faithfully preached





Ian's Ride by Karen Polinsky

While studying as a biology undergrad at UC Santa Cruz, Ian Mackay crashed his bike into a tree on campus. Paralyzed from the neck down, Mackay adapted to his new life with the help of his dedicated family, particularly his mother, Teena Woodward, and a group of guirky friends.

After years of despair, and against all odds, he became an inspiring leader, an innovator with Apple, and a world-record-breaking athlete. He began by traveling bike paths in his local area of Port Angeles, WA, and kept going just a little farther.

In 2016 he rode his power wheelchair across the state of Washington from North to South. The 2016 Ride garnered a great deal of media attention, and Ian became a spokesperson, encouraging the mobility - challenged to get outside and advocating for outdoor accessibility: complete, connected trails and routes for ALL abilities.



In this intimate biography, writer Karen Polinsky recounts lan's accident and determined recovery, in which he discovered the healing power of nature and community.

Hey, Youth! Holy Trinity Lutheran Church is inviting all of you (and your families!) to their youth-led service.



Session Actions

The Session met in a hybrid meeting in the church's upstairs classroom and via Zoom on Monday, May 19 at 7 pm, and the following actions were taken:

- Approved the request to remove Jack Wise and Mary Ann Smith from active membership and place them on the legacy roles.
- Approved vacation request from Pastor Matt from July 24 - August 6 and August 18 - August 31.
- Approved changing the annual agreement to a 2 time per year service agreement with All Weather Heating and Cooling for the maintenance of all furnace and heat exchangers.
- Approved discontinuing the HRA benefit for the Office Manager and adding Family Medical insurance for the Office Manager with Community Health Plan of Washington: Cascade Select Gold plan, family coverage (totaling \$1,015.67 per month).
- Approved the resignation request from Paul Stutesman from the remainder of his Session tenure.

Silver Linings and Golden Opportunities

With tariffs looming and the economy in flux, we've been advised to expect shortages and higher prices, but there may be some silver linings to the doom-and-gloom.

Fast fashion (cheap clothing items from Asia) will take a hit. But according to Earth.org, of the 100 billion garments produced each year, 92 million tons end up in landfills, the equivalent of a garbage truck full per second. Without the usual clothing glut, Mother Earth will give a sigh of relief, and maybe we can abandon retail therapy for a walk in nature or take up a threaded needle and do some mending.

Cleaning supplies will take a hit. Back to soap, vinegar, and soda. On scandishhome.com Noemi creates an all-purpose cleaner with citrus peels, vinegar, and water. I've tried it and it works. She also has many other tips for non-toxic living.

While we have an abundance of food produced nationally, prices have not gone down and there will be some shortages. Young families and those on fixed incomes will be the most impacted by higher prices. So more than ever, we



have a golden opportunity to help those on the edge. Little Free Pantries and food banks can use our donations. First United Methodist Church and Caring for Kids! provide free used clothing in good repair. See pafumc.org and on Facebook: Caring For Kids! for donation details. Watch for opportunities to donate school supplies at local banks or put basic supplies in Little Free Pantries or Little Free Libraries. Also consider donating basic hygiene supplies: shampoo, toothpaste, toilet paper, etc.

Unlike the Samaritan, we may not be able to rescue a wounded foreigner from a ditch and provide for their recovery. But there are many ways we can help our neighbors who may be struggling in these turbulent times.
